Iowa Great Places Awards Major Grants

The Danish Villages of Elk Horn and Kimballton have been awarded \$175,000 from the lowa Great Places fund - \$100,000 for the Jens Jensen Prairie Landscape Park (JJPLP) and \$75,000 for the Little Mermaid Trail.

Designated as an "Iowa Great Place" in 2010, this was the first year that money was available and the committees were pleasantly surprised that their grants were approved for the total amount requested.

Work on the JJPLP will begin next spring with the removal of existing drainage tiles, grading for improved amphitheater site, wetland area and elevation transitions. We will also prepare the land for seeding, plantings, and council ring installation.

Phase I of the Little Mermaid Trail, linking Elk Horn and Kimballton, will begin with hard surfacing of the north end of the trail in Kimballton between the ball park and the Little

Mermaid Park. The south end of the trail, known as "The Friend's Walk" connecting the museumand Bedstemor's House on College Street, will also be hard surfaced.
