Rich Patterson, "What Early Danish Settlers Found in Iowa" August 9:



What did the Elk Horn area look like when European settlers first arrived? What about the rest of Iowa? Rich Patterson, director of the Indian Creek Nature Center in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, will explore the history of the surrounding landscape and lead a walking tour of the museum's Jens Jensen Prairie Landscape Park.

A New Jersey native, Rich Patterson graduated from the University of Idaho with a degree in fishery management. Following three years as a fishery biologist in Alaska he completed a year of graduate study in communications at the University of Northern

Colorado. He has worked for the US Fish and Wildlife Service, the Alaska Department of Fish and Game, and the U.S. Forest Service. He served as Director of the Dillon Nature Center and has been Director of the Indian Creek Nature Center in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, since 1978.

Amel Rahba is one of two new Danish interns at The Danish Immigrant Museum. Currently earning her Masters degree in Cross Cultural Studies from the University of Copenhagen, Amel will spend the next five months in the Collections department cataloging and digitizing the Annelise Clement Stoaks collection. This comprehensive set of materials documents a very unique immigration story involving travel from Denmark to Japan for work just prior to World War II, internment and house arrest during the War, and subsequent immigration to the United States. Amel's work will help make these materials available to museum members and researchers. We are excited to welcome her to the staff!

Kathrine Lia Winkler, who originally hails from Slagelse, is enrolled in a Masters program in International and Global History at Aarhus University following a B.A. degree in Anthropology and Ethnography with a minor in Religion, Politics and Society. She is especially interested in cultural relations between countries as well as how culture is promoted. In Aarhus she was instrumental in establishing an international bar and organizing cultural events for exchange students as well as Danish students. She has traveled in Malaysia, Singapore and Brunei as well as the Philippines, and also has American cousins, descendants of a collateral relative who emigrated to the US. During her internship Kathrine will work on various projects for both the FHGC and the Exhibitions departments.

### "Long-term Lovers" Photo Display at FHGC Through October

Stories and photographs of nearly 50 couples married between 50 and 65 years are on display in the FHGC lobby through the end of October. In addition to wedding and anniversary photos, accompanying materials include such varied items as a dress pattern used for a 1934 marriage, a royal license (kongebrev) from a 1904 marriage in Denmark, love poetry, and poems and songs written to celebrate couples' 'round' anniversaries.

A kongebrev or letter of dispensation, allowing Carl Lynge to marry Anna Schjødt in 1904 without the normal waiting period. Carl was working in Siberia and had returned to Denmark to marry.
