#### brown bag lunch programs

**August 14** | *Was Peter Lassen America's Most Famous Dane? And Why?*Kenneth Johnston previously worked as a park ranger at Lassen Volcanic National Park, where he developed a living history program on Peter Lassen. Lassen has a National Park, a 10,454 foot volcano, a National Forest, a California County and many other things named in his honor. He pioneered the Lassen Trail, over which one third of the 1849 Gold Rush Argonauts traveled.

**September 18** | *It Takes a Village to Raise a Hausbarn* 

Freda Dammen is the director of the German Hausbarn, a 350-year-old building moved from Schleswig-Holstein, Germany, and now a museum in Manning, Iowa.

**September 25** | *Fairy-Tale Language: Hans Christian Andersen*Tom Lundskær-Nielsen is a Senior Lecturer in Danish at the University College London.

**October 16** | Dr. Panum and Measles on the Faroe Islands

Craig Molgaard is a Professor and Chair of the School of Public and Community Health Sciences at the University of Montana, as well as a member of the Museum of Danish America's board of directors. His interest in public health and epidemiology led him to learn about Dr. Panum, a 19<sup>th</sup> century Danish physician who pioneered methods of observation and documentation in the study of disease.

It will be 68 years this month that folk meetings pioneered by N.F.S. Grundtvig have been held at the Danebod Folk School, Gym Hall and Church Complex. A typical folk meeting day includes waking up in the dormitory, delicious communal meals, singing, morning devotions, more singing, coffee, lectures, dancing, and oh, did I mention singing?

It's a time when friendships are made or renewed. The museum's Albert Ravenholt Curator of Danish-American Culture Tova Brandt will open the lecture series by discussing the museum's "Happy Danes on the Plains" traveling exhibit on display at this year's folk meeting. After hosting Saturday morning's kringler and coffee, Museum of Danish America Executive Director John Mark Nielsen and museum member/volunteer Annette Andersen will lead a discussion of the film "Nadjeschda, the Danish-Russian American" (an emigration tale of Andersen's mother). Development Manager Deb Christensen Larsen will represent the museum during her five day attendance.



#### destination orange | August 29-31, 2014

Museum of Danish America will be joining the celebration of international food and culture held in the fair's 15 ethnic streets of Orange, California – the Orange International Street Fair. 
#### genealogy on the road
