tivoli fest review



Sixteen contestants tried their luck and skill at the “Ringridning” bicycle competition during Tivoli Fest, and six were rewarded for their impressive displays of accuracy.

Winners in the 4-7 year old age group were

Also part of the competition was a prize for the Best Decorated Bicycle, as determined by a panel of judges. With many festive touches including red and white paper streamers interwoven between the spokes of her tires and along the bicycle’s frame, several Danish flags, and red and white playing cards on the spokes, Mollie Rasmussen received this award for her spirited efforts.

Prizes included cash and LEGO lunch boxes, water bottles, and storage pieces from the Museum Shop. All participants enjoyed ice cream cones in the favorable weather after their attempts.



Ringridning is a traditional Danish sport most alive in Sønderborg in Southern Denmark. Sønderborg is home to Sønderborg Castle which likely began as a fortified tower constructed by in 1158. Like knights in medieval times, ringridning lets competitors participate in a jousting-like activity where riders (on bicycles, in this instance) charge down an alley through the “gallows” and aim to spear a small metal ring on a lance. Riders are given four tries, with the ring becoming progressively smaller. Each ring is worth a certain amount of points, and the rider with the most points wins.

Due to the success and popularity of the event, the museum is holding a similar competition for both children and adults at Sankt Hans Aften on Saturday, June 21.

OTHER TIVOLI FEST ACTIVITIES

Attendance was over-the-top for all aspects of Tivoli Fest, aided by the great weather. Free admission at the museum, Genealogy Center, and Bedstemor’s House was well-received.



The interns were active in Tivoli Fest this year participating in the parade, ringridning, front desk duties, and Tivoli Feud. A previous Danish intern, Anne Mette, even made it back with her family to help with all of the fun! The interns placed second in the Tivoli Feud competition.

EVENT INCLUDES SHOWING OF "JENS JENSEN THE LIVING GREEN" DOCUMENTARY

Sankt Hans Aften (St. John's Eve) is the annual summer solstice event that has been celebrated since the times of the Vikings. Although it is traditionally held on June 23 in Denmark, the Museum of Danish America marks the occasion annually on a Saturday. This year, the celebration will occur on Saturday, June 21 at the museum.

The atmosphere of friends gathering together makes this one *hyggeligt* (cozy) event. You do not have to be Scandinavian to join in the fun!

- 6 p.m.** A roast-your-own hot dog meal will be available for a free will donation beginning at 6 p.m. in the large Council Ring and will be available throughout the evening as supplies last. Danish-style toppings will be provided.
- 7 p.m.** Ringridning on bicycles for kids and adults – BYOB (Bring Your Own Bicycle). This event was such a hit at Tivoli Fest that it will be continued for children AND adults at Sankt Hans Aften.
- 7:30 p.m.** Showing of the new documentary film "Jens Jensen The Living Green" about the park's namesake who rose from street sweeper to "dean of landscape architects" to pioneering conservationist. june board meeting to be held in luck, wi

The museum's Board of Directors will hold its 97th regular meeting June 12 – 14 in Luck, Wisconsin. Meetings will be held at the West Denmark Lutheran Church located on the shore of Little Butternut Lake. On Friday evening the museum will host members of the community to a showing of the film "Jens Jensen: The Living Green" and a picnic supper. The historic grounds and buildings offer insight into the life and legacy of the community of immigrants from Denmark who settled here. The congregation was founded in 1873; three churches have been built on the site since 1900. The historic site is also home to a gym hall / *forsamlingshus* that features an upper level with exhibits tracing the history of the community. A "Dane School" is also located nearby. The board and staff are very much looking forward to meeting members of the Luck community in June!



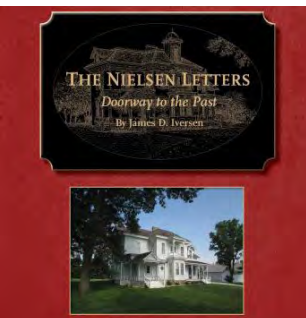
victor borge legacy award recital held

Two winners of the Victor Borge Legacy Award performed on the Museum of Danish America's Victor Borge piano on Sunday, June 1. Katie Payne (Woodbine, IA) and Moriah Hellstrom (Omaha, NE) each played classical solo pieces that highlighted their musical accomplishments, ranging from Bach to Beethoven to contemporary American composers.

As a special finale, Moriah Hellstrom and her mother, Kathy Hellstrom, performed a duet by Randall Compton which was dedicated to Victor Borge by the composer. Weaving together "Chopsticks" with familiar elements of Borge's best-loved routines, this duet featured mother and daughter pushing each other off the piano bench (in the best style of Borge himself) while delivering a high-energy musical flourish. A standing ovation immediately greeted the duo after their final notes.

The performance on the Borge piano was particularly meaningful for three generations of the Borge family attending the recital: Borge's daughter, Janet Borge Crowle; granddaughter, Jennifer; and great-granddaughter Meghan. Janet Borge Crowle and her husband, R. James Crowle have provided financial support for the Victor Borge Legacy Award since it started in 2012.

Pianist Glenn Henriksen of Armstrong, IA, gave an impromptu performance near the end of the post-recital reception at the request of Janet Borge Crowle. Henriksen included Victor Borge's great-granddaughter Meghan in part of the act.



the nielsen letters: doorway to the past

Christian and Anna Nielsen immigrated to Franklin County, Iowa in 1905 and purchased the Harriman acreage in 1920. They and their two daughters, Petrea and Nielsine lived on the Harriman acreage until Nielsine's death in 2001.

Nielsine willed the estate to the Franklin County Historical Society. Volunteers found more than 2,000 letters and many other documents and photographs on the estate dating from the 1890s to 1999, more than 100 years. *The Nielsen Letters* by James Iversen tells the story of the Nielsen family through this fascinating and historically important collection.

A book signing will be held at the Harriman-Nielsen Historic Farm near Hampton, Iowa on June 22 from 2-4 p.m. with live music from pianist Glenn Henriksen at 2:30 p.m.



curatorial center update

The Curatorial Center is a completely solid structure! Mid-April saw the final step in this process – the concrete roof deck. About 26 concrete trucks were needed to complete the roof in one single-day pour. Once this was finished, the interior began to change dramatically. Metal studs outline the rooms and doorframes are in place, electrical conduit and much of the sprinkler system is in, many of the heating and cooling units are installed, and even the windows are in for the offices. The next several weeks will be filled with lots of action as walls and floors are finished, lights are installed, and mobile storage units move in. Stay tuned for more updates!
